PRESERVATION SPOTLIGHT

The Historic Elko County Public Defender's Office

Located at 569 Court Street in Elko, a piece of Nevada's history stands on uncertain ground. Built in 1896 as Nevada's first publicly funded high school, this architectural landmark has played many roles over the decades—serving as a library, the Elko County Manager's office, and now the Elko County Public Defender's Office. Though originally a two-story brick structure, a devastating fire during World War II led to its reduction to a single story. Yet, despite its changes, the building has remained an important part of Elko's history.

Now at risk of demolition for a parking lot, the site was listed on Preserve Nevada's "11 Most Endangered Historic Places." "If community members don't take action, we may lose these places," said Michael Green, Preserve Nevada's Executive Director. Preservationists and community members are working to save this important piece of Elko's history—but its future remains uncertain. "



Preserve Nevada's Mission to Save Endangered Historic Places

Preserve Nevada, a statewide historic preservation organization, works to protect the Silver State's most endangered historic sites through its annual 11 Endangered Sites List. For two decades, Preserve Nevada has identified places at risk—whether facing imminent danger or long-term threats—and advocates for their preservation. NPF'S LEGACY: PAST PROJECTS

In 2021, NPF, in partnership with the City of Las Vegas, developed the Historic Resource Catalog, a tool for preservation planning and research. This database compiles historic surveys, Section 106 reviews, archaeological studies, historic structures reports, and register nominations at the national, state, and local levels, ensuring that Las Vegas' rich architectural heritage is documented and accessible.

Between February and May 2021, NPF gathered 129 reports from institutions such as the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office, Nevada Historical Society, and UNLV & UNR Special Collections Libraries. Indexed by City Ward, the catalog provides easy access to study details, findings, and downloadable PDFs for unrestricted reports.

One site in the catalog is the

Wengert House, now listed on the Las Vegas Historic Register. Once home to Cyril S. Wengert, a key figure in the city's development and an incorporator of NV Energy, this residence remains an important piece of Las Vegas history.

NPF's role in developing this catalog helps preserve the city's history and guides future preservation efforts.

By making these records easily accessible, we help protect Las Vegas' historic sites and provide a valuable resource for researchers, city officials, and advocates working to preserve our shared heritage.
